The Echo staff was made up of five seniors, five juniors, one sophomore, and one freshman. Richard Elliott was the Taylar representative. The yearbook consisted of 144 pages plus a 4 -page full color tip-in for seniors. The total book was done on a Mac-

Intosh computer using Taylor's Vision series. The cost was $\$ 22-\$ 30$. The publishing costs exceeded $\$ 12,000$. The size of The Echo was $7 \% / 4$ by $10^{1 / 2}$ inches. The type used was Mouveau Gothic Italic. For the first time Taylor Publishing used Ultra-Digital processing for pictures. The colors used were Emerald green and Royal purple.

The publisher was Taylor Publishing Company of Dallas, TX. The photographers were Lifetouch of Roanoke, VA, and School Pictures of Bristol, VA. Most of the staff mempers were involved in taking snapshots for the candid pictures.
