
worth and self-respect.

Seniors challenged to improve world


n September of '89 we entered a whole new world, a world full of mystery and beauty. The mystery was that we did not know what was in store for each of us. The beauty was


















What is graduation?


MACC students gained more than subject knowledge























A world of expansion

tudents at Bland High were exposed to three different languages during the 1993-94 school year and initiated new math books.



Finding the right dress, the right date, the right flowers, etc. made preparation for the prom almost more fun than the prom itself.






On October 2, the dance honoring the candidates was held in Wagner Auditorium. While everyone waited for the announcement of the winner music was furnished by John










Denim in all varieties remained the most popular attire for most stu-



ops, movies, gas, and dates were just a few things that students spent their money on each week, but where did all that come from?
























JV faced challenging season











Jan. 17 Earthquake San Fernando valley hit at 4:31 a.m. measuring 6.6 on Richter scale.


Feb. 10 Ice storm Major ice storm brought down trees and power lines leaving some areas powerless for over a week.





















COLOPHON

The Echo staff was made up of five seniors, five juniors, one sophomore, and one freshman. Richard Elliott was the Taylor representative. The yearbook consisted of 144 pages plus a 4-page full color tip-in for seniors. The total book was done on a Mac-

ries. The cost was \$22-\$30. The publishing costs exceeded \$12,000. The size of The Echo was 7% by 10½ Inches. The type used was flouveau Gothic Italic. For the first time Taylor Publishing used Ultra-Digital processing for pictures. The colors used were Emerald green and Royal purple.

The publisher was Taylor Publishing Company of Dallas, TX. The photographers were LifeTouch of Roanoke, VA, and School Pictures of Bristol, VA. Most of the staff members were involved in taking snapshots for the candid pictures.
