## The Endless Journey Continues . . .

Student Life during 1995-96 was an odyssey that came with a guarantee to be anything but boring. As with each school year, faculty and students alike were eager to begin the year and discover what changes had occured during summer vacation. Some changes were welcomed with minimum anxiety while others proved more stressful. A new grade recording system was implemented at the beginning of the school year. Selected school personnel and one work-study student diligently worked throughout the summer to prepare for the beginning of the year. The end of the first six weeks found that the hard work had paid off. Report cards as well as grade sheets were filed into past archives and new computerized print-outs of grades were placed in student grade envelopes. Teachers learned how to record student grades into the computers by class and section numbers. Parents were able to see both numerical grades and comments made by individual teachers. Teachers were set to task to ensure that grades entered into the computers
were accurately recorded and saved. Each month saw a teacher inservice/or workday to more fully prepare for the new computerized systems that were to be used during the school year.

The Bland High School Library also saw a make-over. The process of checking out a book became computerized. Mrs. Elizabeth Newberry held classes for all students and teachers to introduce them to the new technological equipment that would be used during the year. With six new IBM compatible computers packed with software, students were successful in connecting to VA PEN, using UltraVision for yearbook, researching, using encyclopedia references, card cataloging, and book circulation.

Mr. John Chmara and Ms. Jerri Harman joined the secondary faculty and the elementary welcomed Mrs. Debbie Maxfield, Miss Pam Chewning, and Mrs. Lisa Harman. Bland High School's enrollment was 220 at the end of the first semester and Bland Elementary School's enrollment was 309.

As the year progressed, forty-fout seniors were eager to pass through the first portal of their educationat odyssey. With volume 51 of the Echo, we hope that this book has provided a history and a log of that odyssey. The yearbook staff consisted of four Seniors, one Junior, ana three Sophomores. After brainstorming, this staff selectea "Endless Journey" as their theme. This theme symbolizes our odyssey and our sincere hope that our educational journeys will truly and always be endless.

Journeys in practicality

Bland High offers many vocational classes in agriculture and shop, life skills (home economics), Industrial Cooperative Training, and a variety of business classes. In addition to these offerings, students may choose to attend Wythe Vocational classes where they receive practical training and hands-on experience in their selected field. First year students attend morning classes while veteran students go to afternoon sessions.

Students in ICT work after school for local farmers and businesses. In addition to earning-while-learning, these students are exposed to preparing taxes, submitting resumès, and job interviews.

Business classes offer office type environments where students learn the basics of typing and computers. Areas of agriculture and life skills give practical experience to prospective farmers and homemakers.

It was designed by students entirely on IBM compatible computers with ULTRAVISION, a program developed exclusively for Taylor Publishing patrons. It was printed on 20 lb .
gloss paper, $73 / 4 \times 101 / 2$ inches in size, and used typefaces of Freehand Script, Times Roman Italic, Eric, and Weidemann. The cover used an overlay of Fractal material and was designed by the yearbook staff members. The cost of each yearbook was $\$ 30$ - $\$ 36$ to the purchaser.
